

Occupational Health and Safety Week




May 3 to May 9, 2009 was North American Occupational Health and Safety Week. On May 7, 2009 MJMC Career & Employment Services Program hosted an Occupational Health Safety presentation to raise awareness and celebrate our commitment to workplace safety. Thirty-three newcomers to Canada Temporary Foreign Workers attended this event, which was presented by Dean Kush and Guy Richards from Saskatchewan Ministry Advanced Education, Employment and Labour.

Dean and Guy spoke about issues such as: rights and responsibilities as a worker in Saskatchewan (in terms of workplace safety), the importance of timely safety training and the role of Occupational Health and Safety Committees. A package that was designed especially for newly arrived immigrants and temporary foreign workers in Saskatchewan was distributed to all who attended.

Budget Address

On Wednesday, March 18, 2009, the MLA's had invited three students from the LINC 3 class along with Laura and Stefanie to the Legislature in Regina. Having tickets available for the Budget Address was of great excitement. The students enjoyed watching the parliamentary process at work and hearing the financial plans for the Province. They found the language challenging at times, but were glad for the chance to see and hear the process. Some of the students had been to the legislature before when it was empty, but it was a new experience to see the Budget Address in full function.

Daycare Director Completes ECE II Training



Diana Brennan recently completed ECE II training through distance education at SIAST. Due to daycare regulations, Diana is required to completer ECE III training for her position as daycare director. Diana will continue to work towards the completion of an ECE III. Funding for her courses was provided by the Ministry of Education and Moose Jaw Multicultural Council. Renovations at MJMC

MJMC has been undergoing Renovations recently to accommodate the staff growth and expand our licensed daycare. Effective April 1st MJMC signed an additional lease with St. Andrew's Church to rent 1500 square feet on the main floor of the church. Renovations started mid April to divide the space into offices and workstations. The new space will be able to accommodate 9 employees. On June 15 our new space will be operational. The office will be located on the main floor as well as the Executive Director's office, Motif, Finance, The Host Program, and Immigrant Services. MJMC would like to thank St. Andrew's church for their support and patience during the renovations. Next will be renovations to the second floor to accommodate the daycare expansion as well as moves for the employment program, settlement, and LINC classroom. We hope everyone will take a minute to stop in and see our new offices. An official open house will take place in the fall when the second floor renovations are complete.

Career and Employment Services

The Moose Jaw Multicultural Council's Career and Employment Services (CES) Program has recently restructured its programming. As of May 11, 2009 five separate employment related courses will be accessible to all newcomers to Canada (focusing on, but not limited to, newcomer's within the past 5 years), ages 16 and over, who experience cultural and /or literacy barriers to employment. The new programs will offer practical information in the following areas:

- ◆ Workable Life Skills— This 4 day course will provide newcomers with useful information on Canadian life skills and how they relate to obtaining employment. Participants will discover and examine possible barriers to employment and learn new techniques that will help them live a balanced life.
- ♦ Understanding the Canadian Workplace— This 4 day course will provide newcomers with useful information about understanding the Canadian workplace. As a part of the program, participants will lean about Canadian culture vs. their own cultures, Saskatchewan Labour Standards, Occupational Health and Safety and Human Rights.
- ♦ Planning Your Career-This 4 day course will provide newcomers useful information and the ability to plan their own careers. While exploring different "paths to employment", the participants will recognize the value differing work roles; whether in the workforce, at home, in the community or at school.
- ♦ Resume and Cover Letter Writing—This 4 day course will provide newcomers useful information about the importance of a resume, references, and a cover letter.
- ◆ Preparing for Job Search and Interviews— This 4 day course will provide newcomers useful information that will prepare them to search for job—advertisements, access the hidden job market, apply for job openings and learn what to expect form the interview process.
